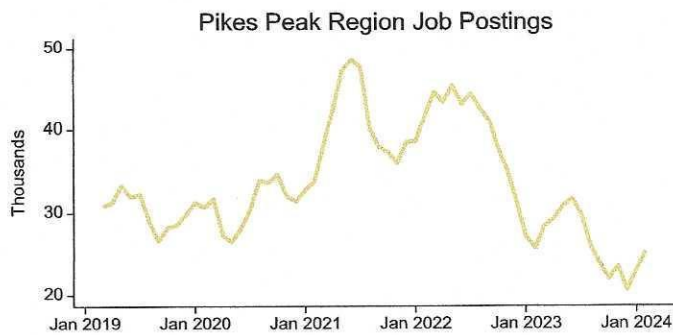


Happy spring from the UCCS Economic Forum!

We've had mixed news on the local employment front. The Bureau of Labor Statistics annual benchmark revisions led to substantial increases in the state and local employment figures for 2023. We already thought the labor market had been strong last year, but the December payroll estimates were upped by 6500 for the Colorado Springs MSA and 47,400 for the state. As revised, the average monthly increase in local payrolls last year was 900, versus 625 pre-revision. For comparison, in 2018-19, the average monthly job gain was 588.

However, while 2023 was even stronger than we thought, the numbers for the first two months of 2024 are showing employment declines. In January and February, local payrolls fell by a total of 900. These estimates are seasonally adjusted, so that's on top of the normal declines we see this time of year. That data is from the survey of business establishments; the numbers from the separate household survey were also negative. The local unemployment rate has risen to 4.3% - that is not seasonally adjusted. We'll have a seasonally adjusted estimate soon - for February, the seasonal adjustment typically reduces the unemployment rate by 0.3-0.5, so we'll almost certainly end up with a higher seasonally adjusted unemployment rate than the 3.6% seen in December and January.

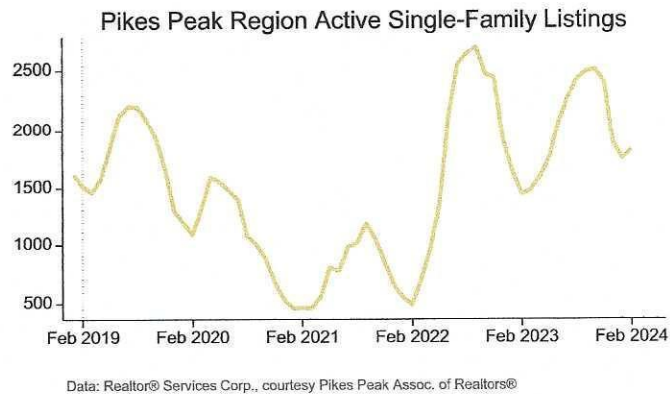
While I wouldn't overreact to two month's data - it can be "noisy," and the February payrolls figure is preliminary - it definitely bears watching to see if a worrisome trend is developing. On a more encouraging note, the number of local job postings has increased in the first two months of 2024, after trending down in the second half of last year.

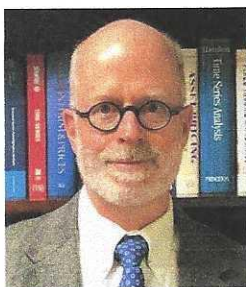
January is always a slow month for retailers, but Colorado Springs city sales and use tax revenue for February, reflecting January sales, did come in 5.1% ahead of the same month in 2023. That largely reversed the year-on-year decline we'd seen last month. The latest retail sales figures we have for El Paso County are for December and show a 6.9% year-on-year decline; if this follows the same pattern as we've seen in the city data, it will improve in January. For the full year 2023, El Paso County retail sales were essentially flat - up 0.12% over 2022 - mirroring what we saw in the Colorado Springs city sales tax collection data. What happens in 2024 will depend partly on home sales, which can lead to purchases of new furniture and appliances.

The median sale price of a single-family home in the region came in at \$455,900 in February, up 1.3% from January and 3.6% from a year ago, though down by 7.9% from the June 2022 peak of \$495,000. Although we're still a few months away from the seasonal peak of activity, the number of active listings is running 26.8% ahead of last year's pace and is also higher than February 2019 and 2020. This is an encouraging sign that we may see a rebound in transaction volume this year. Other things equal, greater supply will put downward pressure on prices (though it is likely there is a considerable amount of pent-up demand as well). One of my favorite metrics of housing affordability, the share of local median income needed for the payments on a house purchased at the local median price, calculated by the Atlanta Fed, improved to 40.1% in January. That's down from 45.4% last October, but still well above the government's affordability benchmark of 30%, which Colorado Springs met until mid-2021.



Nationally, employment growth continues to be strong with payrolls increasing by 275,000 in February (subject to revision). As has often been the case recently, the data from the household survey was considerably weaker, with the unemployment rate increasing from 3.7% to 3.9%. The payrolls figure comes from the survey of business establishments, which is considered more statistically reliable because of a larger sample size. The same pattern was seen in the data for Colorado, where payrolls increased in February, but so did the unemployment rate (from 3.4% to 3.5%). Some have expressed concern about the US labor force participation rate – it was unchanged in February at 62.5%, but still below the February 2020 mark of 63.3%. However, the participation rates for persons aged 25-54 and 55-64 are higher than in February 2020; the decline in the overall rate has been driven mainly by a decline in participation rates among those over 65, as well as an increased share of over-65's as the population ages.

Inflation readings from the Consumer Price Index (CPI) have been higher than hoped-for in the first two months of the year. On a year-on-year basis, overall February inflation was 3.2% and core inflation, which excludes food and energy, was 3.8%. Last week, the Fed signaled that is not changing course based on these numbers. We'll have the Fed's preferred inflation measure, the Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) price index, for February on March 29.



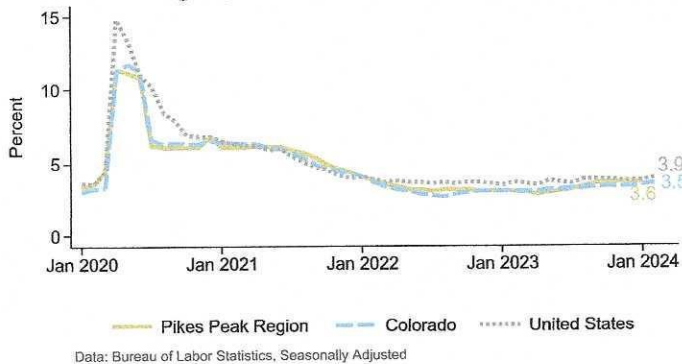

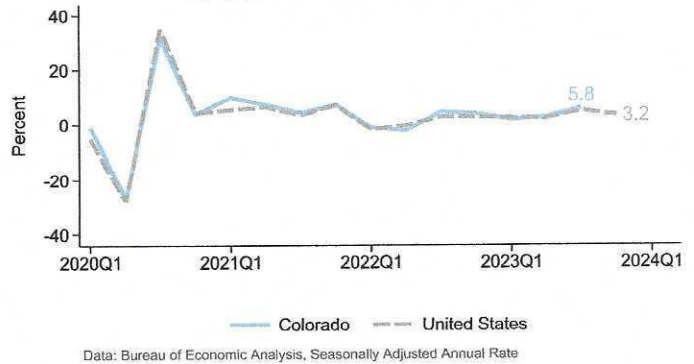

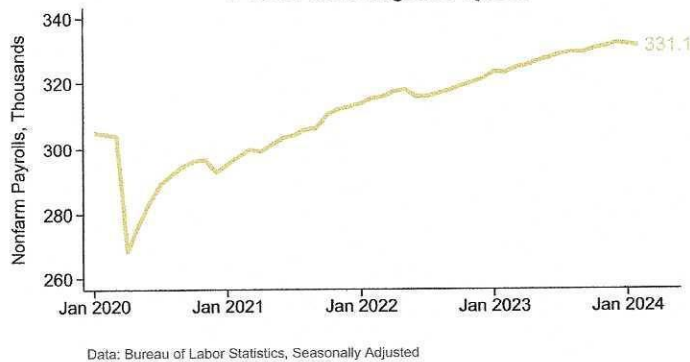
Pikes Peak Region, Colorado and US Unemployment Rates



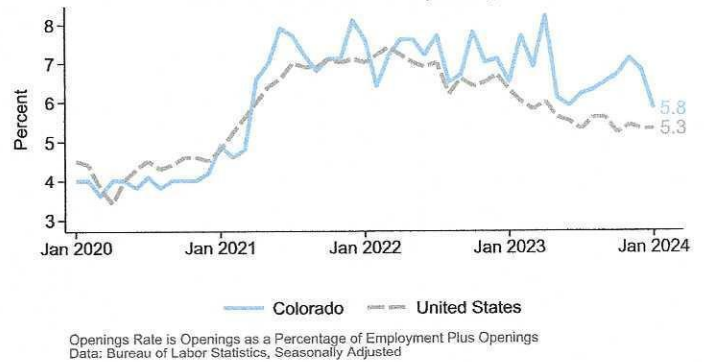
Colorado and US Real GDP Growth

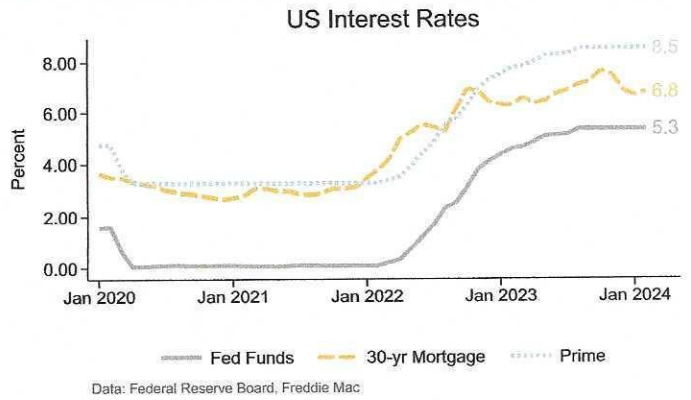

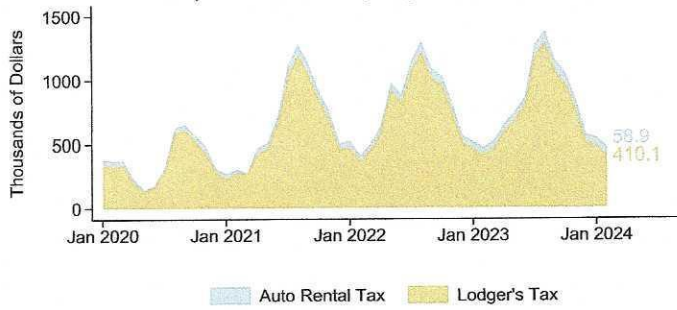

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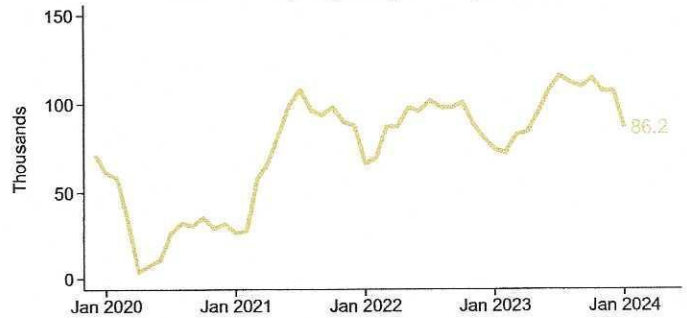

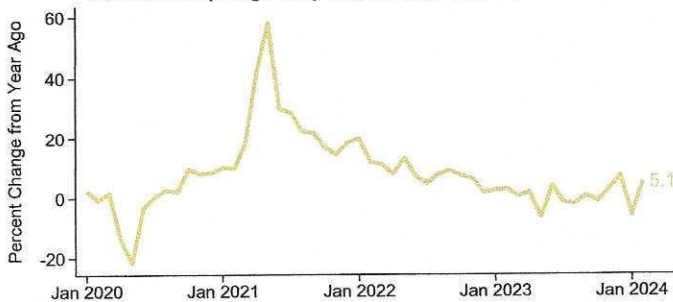
Colorado Springs Airport Enplanements

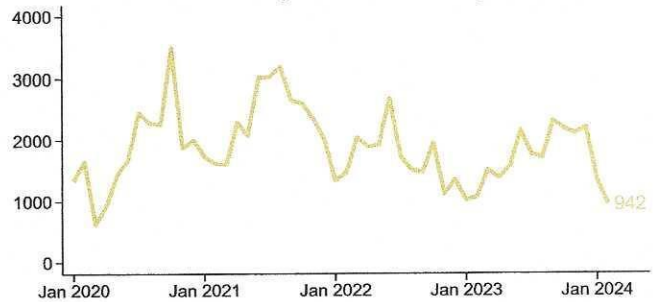

Colorado Springs City Sales and Use Tax Collections



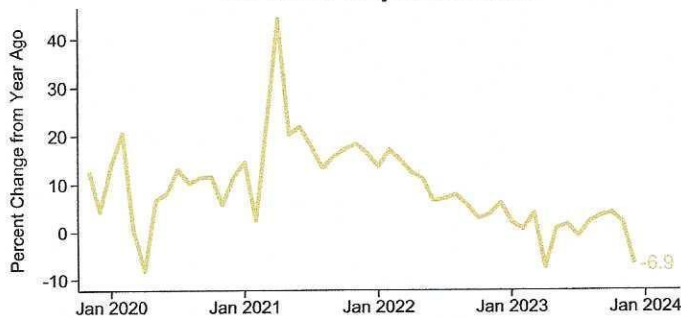

El Paso County New Vehicle Registrations



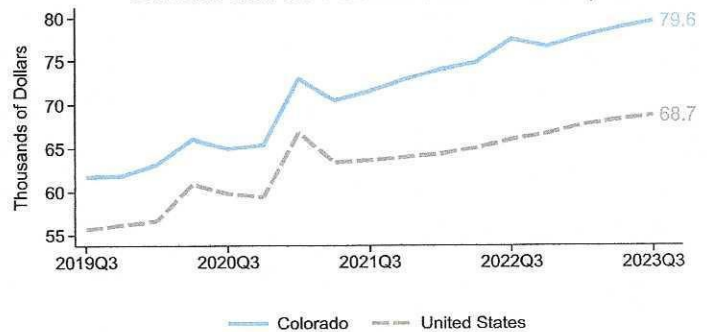

El Paso County Retail Sales



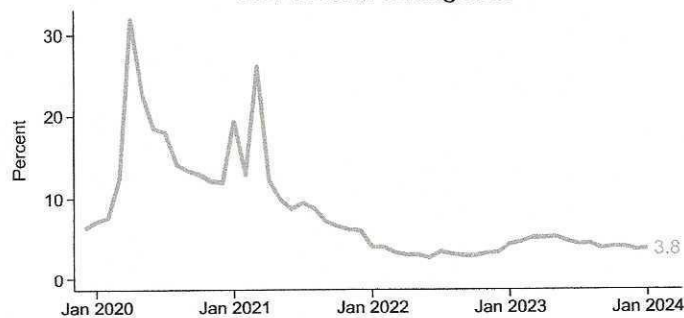

Colorado and US Personal Income Per Capita



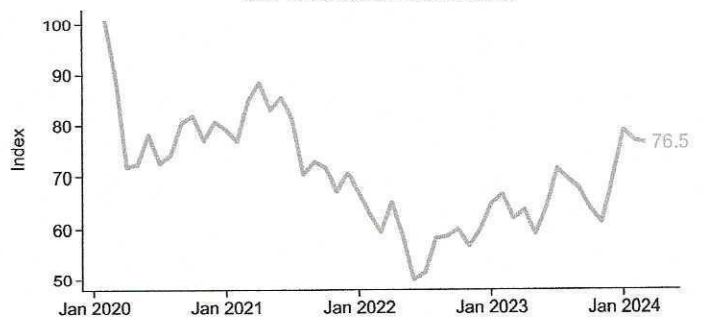

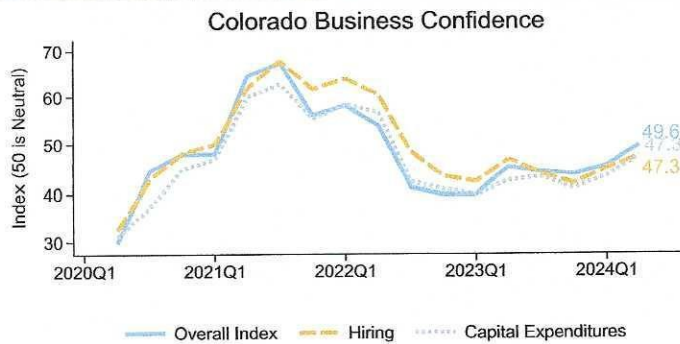

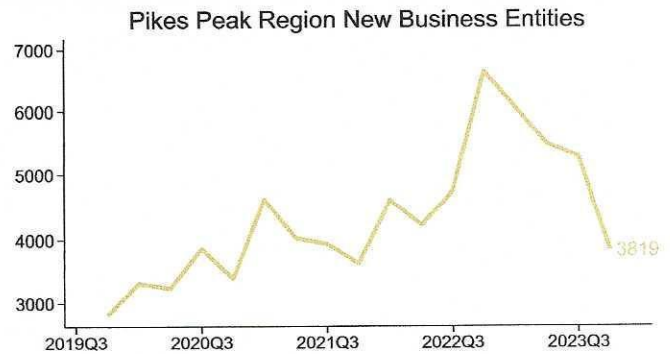
